

Mordiford CE Primary School Pupil Premium Funding 2015-2016

In 2011-12 the Government launched its Pupil Premium funding. This money is delegated to schools based on the numbers of pupils in the school who are eligible for Free School Meals (FSM). From 2012-13, it has been expanded to include all children who have been eligible for FSM in any of the previous 6 years. This money is allocated to initiatives to ensure pupils reach their full potential, both academically and socially. Pupil Premium is also used for children looked after, children of armed services personnel and children adopted from care.

At Mordiford CE Primary School we have a relatively small number of pupils who are eligible for pupil premium. In the January 2015 census the figure was about 12% of the school roll.

The table below outlines our aim to support the children in our school who are eligible for Pupil Premium funding.

Focus for Pupil Premium spending 2015-2016

- Purchasing of booster material for literacy and numeracy, Engaging Eyes, Literacy toolbox, Nessy Keys and others £1500
- Investment in basic skills maths resources £1400
- Purchase of specialist equipment e.g. writing slopes, chair supports, adapted pencils, coloured overlays, coloured paper £500
- Support to purchase coloured lens glasses £200
- Targeted additional 1:1 support in Y3 from teaching assistants £ 3,200 (x 36 weeks)
- Structured small group tuition in Y3 from teaching assistants £2,720 (x 36 weeks)
- Targeted additional 1:1 support in Y6 from teaching assistants £ 3,200 (x 36 weeks)
- Structured small group tuition in Y6 from teaching assistants £2,720 (x 36 weeks)
- Educational Psychologist and other support services £1000
- Provision for children attending trips including residential visits.£1000
- Inclusion in after-school clubs and peripatetic music sessions £1000

How will the impact of Pupil Premium Spending be monitored?

- Through rigorous and regular Pupil Progress Meetings the impact of interventions will be monitored to decide whether
 children entitled to Pupil Premium are making progress, in line with their non-pupil premium peers, in terms of academic
 progress, self-esteem, physical well-being and attendance
- Involve whole staff in decisions about what next steps could be taken to narrow the gap for children receiving Pupil Premium
- Records will be kept and monitored for intervention groups
- Continue to monitor the specific impact of successful interventions/actions/resourcing
- Meet regularly with the Pupil Premium Governor, Mr Chris Nicholl, and update the Governing Body on a regular basis.
