 Our curriculum works with the Herefordshire SACRE agreed syllabus, Understanding Christianity and Discovery RE We study Religion and Worldviews (RW) and our lessons are called RW rather than RE We study Christianity, Judaism, Hinduism, Sikhism, Islam and Humanism Opportunities to inspire children's curiosity about the world of RW A well-planned progression of skills to enable children to work on and develop new skills/knowledge each year. To use a range of strategies to allow children to think and consider the big questions that the RE curriculum brings. We aim to ensure that all thinking, and reflection time is purposeful and leads to deeper learning. When planning units of work that consider big questions and development of knowledge, we ensure that there are ample opportunities for pupils to think and reflect on their learning. RW books move with the children through the classes EYFS and Year 1 have a floor book to record their learning in this subject. Links with other areas of the curriculum are embraced to provide a more meaningful learning experience. During their time at Mordiford they will get the opportunity to go on trips to develop local, regional and global RW experiences
